Abortion on Demand

President Trump has proven his pro-life commitment. As president he has appointed pro-life advocates in his cabinet and administration, restored the "Mexico City Policy," and he has pledged "to veto any legislation that weakens current pro-life federal policies and laws, or that encourages the destruction of innocent human life."

The Repercussions of the Passage of Amendment 2 - Medicaid Expansion

hy the silence about "morning after pill" abortions in the recent debate over Amendment 2? And why the failure to take seriously the growing political onslaught to terminate the Hyde Amendment in 2021?

Missouri Right to Life brought the first subject up several times in opposing Amendment 2, but proponents of Medicaid expansion ignored it.

Proponents failed to acknowledge that "morning after pills" often prevent implantation of a new human being and that the Hyde Amendment has never blocked Medicaid payments for "drugs

The wrong of using a pill that often causes abortions is the same as the wrong of doing any reckless act that puts human life at risk. Reimbursing someone for taking a pill that may cause the death of an unborn child is as wrong as paying someone to play Russian roulette.

Subsidizing a product usually increases its usage. By greatly increasing the number of women of child-bearing

By greatly increasing the number of women of child-bearing age whose "morning after" pills will be subsidized, Amendment 2 is bound to result in a sizable increase in abortions in Missouri that are caused by such pills.

Preventing implantation affects a week-old human being who is comprised of more than 100 self-organized cells that are already beginning to specialize. He or she needs to implant to keep on living. Preventing implantation causes his or her death, and that is an abortion.

Recent research demonstrates that in many cases, "morning after pills" cause abortions rather than preventing conception. Researchers in one of the larger studies of "Plan B" concluded, "When given after intercourse in the fertile period and before . . . ovulation, Plan B fails to act as a contraceptive 80-92% of the time; it acts instead as an abortifacient, " C. Kahlenborn, et al., "Mechanism of action of levonorgestrel emergency contraception," The Linacre

age whose "morning after" pills will be subsidized, Amendment 2 is bound to result in a sizable increase in abortions in Missouri that are caused by such pills.

For the same reason — the increase in eligible recipients — an end of the Hyde Amendment now that Amendment 2 has passed means a much greater death toll will result than if Amendment 2 had failed. Proponents dismissed the probability of ending the Hyde Amendment because of public opinion polls that asked questions in a vacuum. The prospect of a government shutdown if anti-life forces will not approve a federal budget unless it is stripped of the Hyde Amendment will change the calculus of legislators very quickly. Moreover, the anti-lifers control

the House now; the election may give them the Senate and/or the Presidency too.

Furthermore, if Hyde is ended, proponents promised that pro-life states like Missouri would "pursue every legal avenue" to protect the unborn. They overlook the applicable law. Missouri statutes cannot prevail over federal statutes that establish and govern the Medicaid partnership between federal and state governments. Medicaid law compels a state to reimburse for health services required by the federal government, unless excepted by a specific federal law such as the Hyde Amendment. Planned

Parenthood Affiliates v. Engler, 73 F.3d 634 (6th Cir. 1996); Hodgson v. Board of County Comm'rs, 614 F.2d 601, 608 (8th Cir.1980). That federal law preempts any more restrictive state law regarding Medicaid is a well-established principle. The precedents are clear and overwhelming.

In addition, Missouri is already under a federal injunction dating from the mid-90s that prohibits Missouri from enforcing a mini-Hyde Amendment that is stricter than the federal Hyde Amendment. Stangler v. Shalala, 1994 WL 764104 (Order Granting Summary Judgment, W.D. Mo. Dec. 28, 1994) (enjoining the State from enforcing § 208.152.1(12), RSMo.)

The proponents of Medicaid expansion never mentioned these legal straitjackets when they minimized the danger of an end to the Hyde Amendment. Now there is more reason than ever for all pro-life people to work hard to prevent the pro-abortionists from fulfilling their vows to destroy it.

Virginia Evers, inventor of the "precious feet" pin, dies at 99

Pro-life activist Virginia Evers, who invented the "precious feet" pin that many pro-life Americans proudly wear, died on July 17 at the age of 99.

According to Live Action News, the precious feet pin "was inspired by a photograph that pro-life Dr. Russell Sacco took of the feet of a 10-week old aborted baby in the early 1970s when abortion was first legalized through Roe v. Wade." Sacco's photograph ended up being a full-page ad in a San Diego newspaper on Jan. 22, 1974, the first anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision. After Evers and her husband, Ellis, saw the ad, she said, "these little feet would be the ideal pro-life symbol."

Not long after Evers made that statement about the precious feet, she and her husband founded a ministry called Heritage House '76. The ministry sells precious feet pins designed by Evers, which are "the exact size and shape of an unborn baby's feet at 10 weeks after conception." In a fact sheet outlining the story of the precious feet,

Evers said at the time, "In 1979, at a worldwide symposium in Dublin, Ireland, the 'precious feet' were named the international pro-life symbol." At the time of the fact sheet's publication around 1994, nearly 12 million precious feet pins had been distributed in 30 countries and on six continents.

"The greatest reward for our labor is the fact that the precious feet save babies lives," she added. "A birthright volunteer visited a pregnant teenager contemplating abortion in a juvenile facility. The volunteer gave her literature and the precious feet pin from her lapel, explaining their significance (the girl was exactly 10 weeks pregnant). She learned that the girl's roommate was pregnant and definitely planning on an abortion. We were later informed by letter 'the precious feet pin did its work—we were able to save not one but two babies."

Years after the couple retired from Heritage House '76 in the early 1990s, their legacy lives on. Their daughter and son-in-law, Dinah and Mike Monahan, took over upon her parents' retirement. Mike Monahan later died in an ATV accident in 2016, but by that time his son, Brandon, had taken on the leadership role at Heritage House '76.

Over the years, national political figures have embraced the precious feet pin. In 2000, Republican presidential candidate Alan Keves adopted the precious feet as his campaign symbol. The Washington Post reported that a precious feet pin was one of many pins worn by then-Milwaukee County, Wisconsin, Sheriff David Clarke as he gave a speech at the 2016 Republican National Convention.

Manifesto from Long-Time Pro-Lifer

The pro-life movement has proven capable of longsuffering in the fight to end abortion. Many of us have been in this fight for decades. I stand on the shoulders of giants who came before me and began their work long ago, and the next generation of pro-life activists is already rising up to carry on the mission.

Our ability to adapt and evolve despite lost Supreme Court cases, the silence of religious leaders, and the betravals of politicians is a testament to the trajectory of this movement toward victory.

The pro-life movement will persist until abortion is rejected by both our laws and our culture. The pro-life movement is outfunded by the abortion industry by orders of magnitude. Our political power is outflanked by pro-abortion super PACs, and tech giants and mainstream media outlets work to silence or mischaracterize us on a daily basis. Yet the truth that it is wrong to kill the innocent is written so deeply into the human conscience that our victory over Big Abortion is only a matter of time. We need only call out what humans know to be true: All of us are equal, and it is wrong to do fatal violence to our society's youngest, most defenseless members.

America has always led the world in defending human rights. We can restore the paradigm of protection of the preborn child and the dignity of mothers for the rest of the world. What is required of us in these moments, when we feel we have lost a battle, is to recommit ourselves to waking up every morning and saying "Yes" to winning the war.

8th Circuit set to hear lawsuit challenging "Missouri Stands For the Unborn Act"

The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has set a hearing for September 24 for oral arguments for Planned Parenthood's challenge to HB 126, the "Missouri Stands for the Unborn Act." A three-judge panel was to hear the case in mid-April 2020, but arguments were delayed because of the pandemic.

Missouri Right to Life worked closely with pro-life legislators to pass this groundbreaking, life-saving legislation, and Governor Parson signed it into law in May 2019.

Pray for the judges that will hear the arguments in support of HB 126 and for Missouri's Attorney General and Solicitor General as they prepare to present the facts of "Missouri Stands for the Unborn Act."

ABSENTEE & MAIL-IN BALLOT INFORMATION

During the November General Election, Missouri voters will be eligible to cast ballots by mail with notarization of the ballot envelope. To assist voters to find a notary public to notarize their absentee or mail-in ballot envelopes at no cost, the Secretary of State's Office has compiled a list of notaries who have volunteered to provide this service at no charge. Voters in at-risk categories for contracting or transmitting COVID-19 are eligible to vote by absentee ballot without obtaining notarization.

A summary of your options is available on the Missouri Secretary of State's website, https://www.sos.mo.gov/elections, with links to the notary list, the revised absentee application, and the mail-in ballot application.
